



AHEC Program Highlight The Central Alabama Neighborhood Health Initiative

The Southeast Alabama AHEC Program (SEAAHEC) consistently works to update their recurring programs and health initiatives to better serve the community throughout Alabama. This month we are highlighting SEAAHEC's Central Alabama Neighborhood Health Initiative (CANHI).

In July 2021, the Southeast Alabama AHEC, along with the City of Montgomery and other grant partners, were awarded \$3.9 Million by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' - Office of Minority Health as part of the federal initiative to Advance Health Literacy to Enhance Equitable Community Responses to COVID-19. The Central Alabama Neighborhood Health Initiative (CANHI) was founded to collaboratively increase the rates of COVID-19 testing and vaccinations, increase health literacy, improve patient experience, and patient-provider relations in Elmore, Montgomery, and Pike Counties. The grant focuses primarily on addressing disparities related to health literacy among minority populations within the service area.

Activities include:

- Health literature distribution. It has become increasingly important for people to have access to
 factual health-based literature. At distribution sites within the grant service area, literature, is
 readily available to any individual seeking knowledge on a given health-related topic, including
 COVID-19.. A variety of credible sources including the CDC, NIH, etc, provide the health-based
 literature to these communities. Distribution sites include schools, colleges, businesses, clinics,
 and social service organizations.
- Health literacy workshops. SEAAHEC's Program Manager; Ayanna Sterling, conducts health
 literacy workshops which focuses on empowering community members to ask questions, identify
 their health care advocates, and identify credible sources of health information.
- Health literacy training opportunities. In collaboration with Health Literacy Expert Dr. Michael Paasche-Orlow, Health Literacy training has been offered to all grant partners, ALAHEC center CHWs, ALAHEC Scholars, and ALAHEC center staff. Sessions provide participants with the opportunity to practice the skills being taught.
- Community health workers (CHWs). There are currently 14 CHWs serving as Vaccine
 Ambassadors for the Health Literacy Program. All CHWs must be vaccinated and receive online
 training on health literacy-related topics.
- Health events. CHWs and SEAAHEC's Program Manager, Ayanna Sterling, maintain a regular
 presence at community events, where they distribute literature and CANHI swag, field surveys,
 and promote the grant offerings and activities. The goal is to bring social service providers to
 communities with limited access to resources. This helps to mitigate accessibility challenges and
 allows community members to encounter resources that they may not know exist or have access
 to otherwise.
- Healthcare surveys. The CANHI evaluation team developed a Healthcare survey to field
 questions related to patient-provider communication. The data collected is then used to develop
 health literacy training and continuing education opportunities for providers. Anyone can complete
 the survey by visiting the website or by texting 'HEALTH' to 69083.
- SMS Text Messaging Campaign. One of the most distinguishing components of CANHIs
 activities is the implementation of a text messaging campaign facilitated by Leafpoint. Anyone
 completing a survey can opt-in to the campaign to receive valuable information about COVID-19
 and CANHI activities.

The networking opportunities provided to me by the program and facilitated by our fantastic program director, Md. Ikbal Parveg, has also been extremely beneficial. Meeting with the Statewide AHEC Advisory Council in Birmingham allowed me to share my experiences with those in charge of program advising and enhancement as well as highlight the great work that Southern Alabama AHEC is involved in.
